#### Value of the Month

During October we will be focusing on the value of Equality, this also links with Black History Month. During assemblies and class PSCHE discussion sessions we will be focusing on the following questions:

Why should we treat everyone fairly? Why do some people treat others unfairly? What will help you to achieve your goals? How could we make the world a fairer place?

As part of our focus on Black History Month all the classes will be focusing on event in the life of Nelson Mandela, our inspirational person.

News from the classes this week:

#### **Foundation Stage**

In Foundation Stage this week we have been retelling and acting out the story of the 'Little Red Hen'. We have continued to practise writing our names and recognising numbers and counting. We have had our first PE lessons and although it took us a while to change, most of us were really independent. We have also been learning about the five senses and the parts of our bodies we use to when we hear, see, smell, touch and taste things. In phonics we have learnt the sounds i,n,m and d and are using the sounds we know ( s,a,t,p,i,n,m & d) to start to sound out and blend 3 letter words. #### Year One

In English, we have been enjoying 'The Gruffalo's Child' this week. We identified the characters in the story and then focussed on the setting. We went for a walk along the woods and thought of some great words to describe them. We then wrote sentences describing the setting. This week we also helped the Gruffalo. He was worried because the Gruffalo child had gone missing. We helped him by making some posters to try to help find her! This week in maths, our focus has been on addition. We have been reading and writing number sentences and we have been using lots of different equipment to help us to find our answers. We really enjoyed working outside this week in Maths! In topic lessons we have been thinking about the differences and similarities between ourselves and our friends. We also loved the story 'My Mum is Fantastic' by Nick Butterworth. We thought of lots of reasons why we all think our mums are fantastic. We also made a collection of adjectives to describe our mums....they were all lovely!

#### **Year Two**

This week, in Year 2, we have been exploring the facts about 'The Great Fire of London'. We have sorted facts into those that are true and those that are false. We have also enjoyed experiencing the event through drama and role play. Having imagined that we were there at the time of the fire, we wrote a letter of apology from Thomas Farrinor to the King. We published this letter on old, charred paper! In Phonics, we have been continuing to learn the spelling rules for adding the suffixes –ing and –ed. Some children have been practising at home using the spelling lists on the VLE – well done! In Maths, we have been consolidating our understanding of place value. We have explored different ways to partition 2-digit numbers and compared numbers using the signs for greater than (>) and less than (<). In Topic, we have enjoyed learning songs about 'The Great Fire of London'. We have practised and performed songs such as 'Flow, Flow, Flow' and 'Loaves of bread', puddings and pies! Also, we learned and performed a Harvest poem in our Harvest assembly on Thursday.

#### **Year Three**

In English, we started the week writing with imaginative description using lots of fantastic adjectives. We then wrote similes about volcanoes and descriptive sentences using first person. Towards the end of the week, we wrote our very own Volcano calligrams and completed a SMART write activity to end. In Maths this week, we looked at representing numbers. We used lots of Mathematical equipment this week including Base 10, Place value counters, measuring equipment and Cusienaire Rods. We looked at identifying and estimating numbers in different representations as well as discussing where, when, how and why number helps us in the world that we live in. In Topic we found out about the destruction of Pompeii. We have also started designing our volcanoes that we aim to start building very soon.

#### **Year Four**

In English this week, we have begun writing non-chronological reports based on creatures from 'The Spiderwick Chronicles'. We have looked at features of non-chronological reports and thought carefully about how we can apply these to our own reports. In maths this week, we have continued with our work on number and place value. We have looked at counting back through zero into negative numbers, partitioned 4-digit numbers using different representations and found 1000 more or less than a given number. In our topic lessons, we have researched information about rainforest animals, in order to create a wildlife guide that we will be working on next week. https://www.activewild.com/rainforest-animals-list/

#### **Year Five**

This week in English, Year Five has been reading' Friend or Foe' by Michael Morpurgo. We imagined what it would be like to be evacuated and wrote setting descriptions of Paddington Station, which we have edited and improved. We have just found out what happens to David when he arrives in Exeter, and have started to write recounts in the form of diary entries. In maths, Year Five has been looking at negative numbers, and using these to count forwards and backwards through zero. We have also been revising Roman Numerals to one thousand, and have now started a new unit on strategies for addition and subtraction. In topic lessons, we have been learning about the different types of air raid shelter that were used during World War Two. We have also located cities on the map of the UK which were heavily bombed during the Blitz. Year Five are now writing a recount, imagining that they are in an air raid.

#### **Year Six**

In English this week we have started a new unit of work based on 'Boy: Tales of Childhood' by Roald Dahl. This book is an autobiography based on Roald Dahl's life up to the age of 20. We have written our own sweet stories after reading 'Why you should never eat liquorice bootlaces'. We have also written a detailed description of Mrs Pratchett, the cruel, disgusting sweet shop owner. One of our favourite chapters so far has been 'The Great Mouse Plot' where Roald Dahl and his friends put a dead mouse in Mrs Pratchett's jar of gobstoppers. We are using this chapter to write our own play scripts. In our Grammar sessions, we have been writing extended noun phrases and our spelling focus has been words with a 'shus' sound, spelt -tious. In Maths, we have been performing mental calculations, including those with mixed operations and large numbers and using useful estimates to check the reasonableness of an answer. We have also been using our knowledge of BIDMAS to help us understand the order of operations when solving calculations involving the four operations. In Topic, we have investigated the effect of adding more bulbs or batteries to a complete circuit. We have also started to explore our understanding of light. On Tuesday we visited the Town hall to watch an E-safety production.
